

As you head to the second floor, be sure to notice the signage and amenities. This 13,420 SF clubhouse was made possible by a generous donation from the LTR Lewis Cloverdale Foundation and is designed to foster community, volunteerism, activities, and opportunities to connect with residents. The facility was designed to house seniors from 3rd Ward and Montrose, allowing the leaders who helped establish these great neighborhoods to live close to their communities, congregations, and cherished spaces. Our residents are dynamic leaders, activists, artists and so much more.

Walk down the hallway and up the stairwell to the second floor to continue the tour.

Welcome to the second floor of the clubhouse and our History Hall. This hallway has incredible light throughout the day and looks out onto the Rainbow Tower.



According to the U.S. Census, every day 10,000 Baby Boomers turn 62. This is known as a demographic shift often referred to as the "age wave" or "gray tsunami." According to the National Coalition for the Homeless, there are at least nine seniors waiting for every one occupied unit of affordable senior housing nationwide. In some cases, a senior can spend three to five years on the wait list for access to affordable housing. Additionally, more than 60 affordable senior communities were damaged or destroyed in past natural disasters, such as Hurricane Harvey.

In the middle of the History Hall you will find our business center, which houses computers, printer, and volunteer opportunities to help our seniors bridge the tech divide. A majority of our seniors do not have access to the Internet or smart phones. This can create significant challenges during pandemic lockdowns and can further isolate our seniors.

Because of this space, our seniors will be able to stay in touch virtually with friends and loved ones near and far. Thanks to supporters like you, we have been able to realize our vision so that our seniors can age with dignity and pride in a safe community.



Named in honor of the late Chris Kerr, who worked at the Montrose Center for 19 years.


Make your way across the hall to Stop #6:

As you exit the Library, make sure to look to your left and see another view of the Rainbow Tower from the second floor.
Rainbow light comes into this area at different times during the day, making this is a favorite spot for our residents to drink coffee and visit. As you walk to the end of the hall and leave the clubhouse, you will be entering the residential area of the center.

To your left you will see one of the facilities' Trash Rooms. These are on each floor throughout the building so our residents do not have to carry their trash too far from their apartments. This trash chute, which has an entrance on each of the four floors, was made possible by a generous donation from Ken Council.



LGBTQ seniors are twice as likely to age in social isolation and four times less likely to have the money needed for retirement in comparison to their heterosexual peers. Add to this the lack of city- or state-wide protections for the LGBTQ community against housing discrimination, plus lack of affordable living options for LGBTQ seniors, and it is clear that our seniors need a place to age with dignity and pride in a stable, safe and accepting community. The Law Harrington Senior Living Center is open to all seniors who meet the income guidelines, but will have specific services and programming for LGBTQ seniors and seniors living with HIV.

Walk down the hallway of the facility to head to the Main Courtyard.




As you walk the halls, note the indoor mailroom, elevators, inset apartment entries and wide hallways of this four-story complex that has 84 one- and 28 two-bedroom apartments. Many focus groups and volunteers advised the Center to help us get the facilities features right. For example, the inset apartment entries keep the hallways from feeling cold and create a sense of arrival as our residents enter their homes. The two mailrooms are indoors in a climate-controlled environment so that residents do not have to venture outside for their mail.

The entire facility is Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)


Compliant, and there are ADA rooms which have specially designed kitchens with lower counters and center islands, lower switches, cabinet cut-outs that allow a wheelchair to pull up under the sink or counter, a single washer/dryer unit, and a larger bathroom with a lipless tub.
